This course is tailor-made for primary school students who Struggle in primary school.

1. Struggle in primary school.

Many primary school students encounter challenges in developing crucial study and emotional skills. These difficulties can lead to struggles in primary school and potentially falling behind in high school.

These one-on-one sessions for primary school students focus on strategies to address challenges commonly encountered in primary school, such as:

- Weak study skills, including time management and note-taking.
- Lack of motivation.
- Learning disabilities.
- Trouble grasping and keeping up with material.
- Difficulty focusing on tasks.
- Anxiety or low self-esteem.
- Tense relationships with teachers and classmates.

The session aims to assist your child in:

- Building a positive attitude towards school.
- Fostering a passion for learning.
- Learning effective summarization.
- Creating concise exam units instead of lengthy summaries.
- Developing useful memory aids and using mind maps effectively.
- Responding effectively to different styles of exam questions.
- Developing techniques for writing plans for stories and essays under exam conditions
